Natural Areas — These guides provide detailed descriptions of interesting places to walk and hike in the Capital Region. Each one includes directions, trail maps, and information relevant to the area. Natural Area guides are available for Schenectady, Albany, Saratoga, and Rensselaer counties.

Along the Bike Hike Trail — Another series of ECOS guides provides descriptions of the flora and fauna, interesting places, and local history along the bikeways. Each one offers a list of organizations and contacts to make your trip more enjoyable, whether you are hiking or cycling. These guides cover Schenectady, Albany, and Montgomery counties.

ECOS Ski & Snowshoe Tips — ECOS has created a book with maps featuring cross-country ski and snowshoe areas for seven counties.

Wildflowers Along the Way — This beautifully illustrated guide offers pen-and-ink drawings and detailed descriptions of selected local wildflowers.

A Field Guide to the Karner Blue Butterfly — This guide presents pen-and-ink illustrations and photos of plants and animals associated with the life and habitat of the Karner blue butterfly.

Trees and Shrubs of the Capital Region and **Ferns of the Capital Region, A Guide to Species Identification** — Both of these publications were created by naturalist Ed Miller. They contain a collection of essays on local trees, shrubs, and ferns.

Spring Walks— Enjoy the warm spring scents and emerging new life as we welcome the season.




Fall Foliage Walks— What can compare with a walk in the brisk fall air, surrounded by magnificent color?
